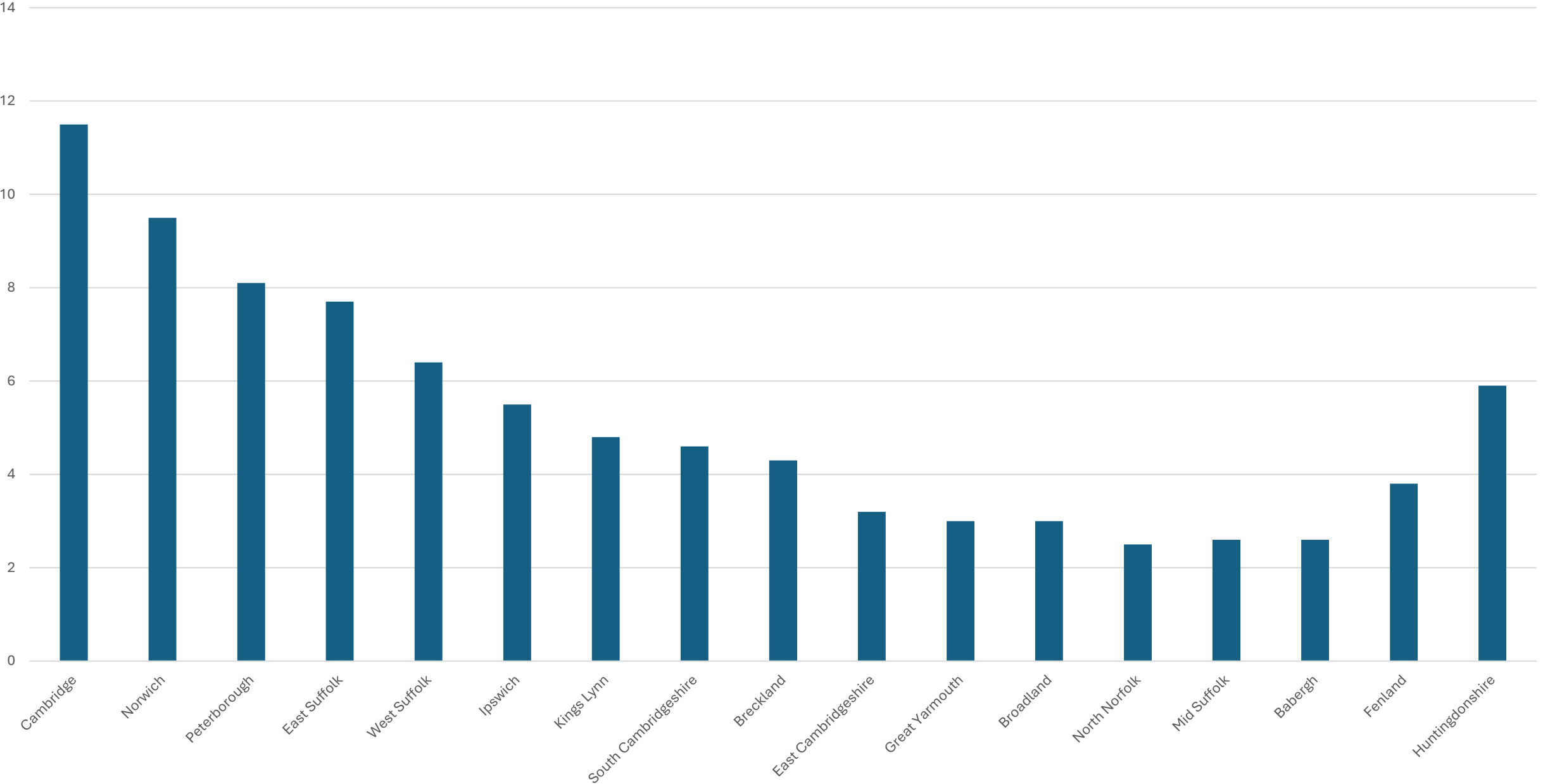

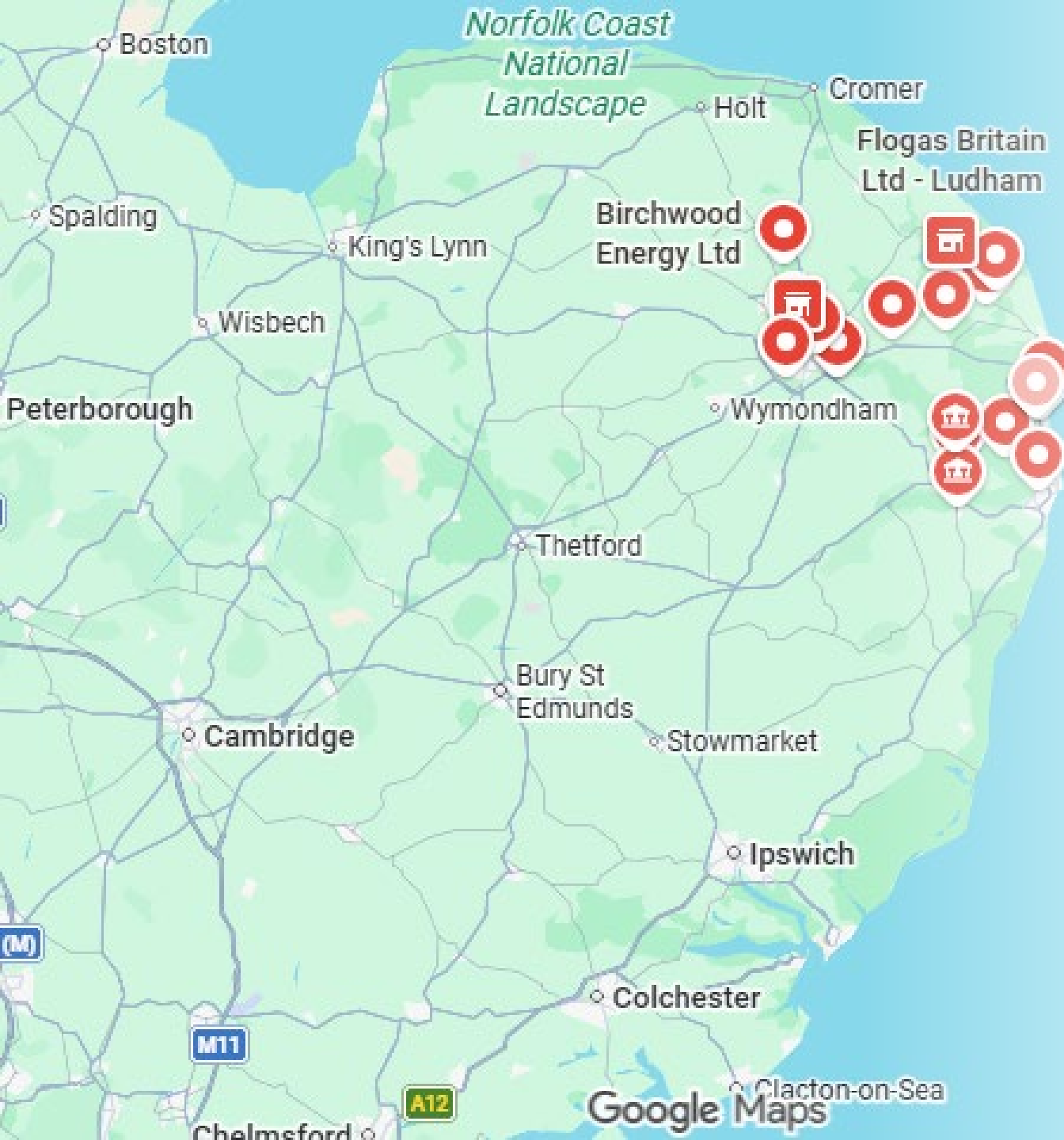

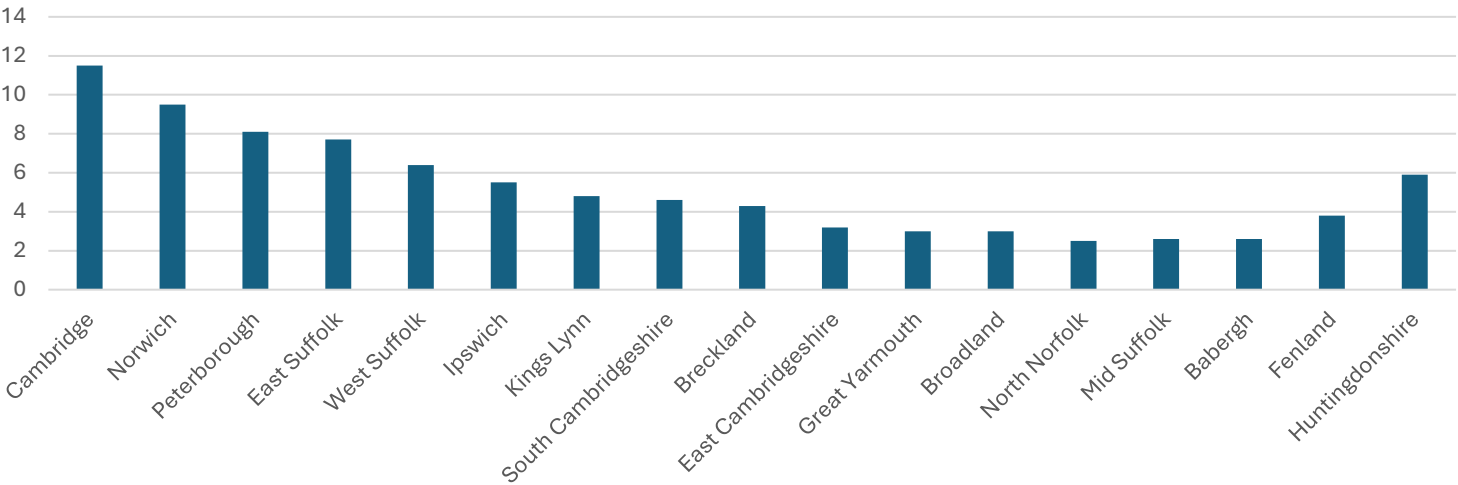

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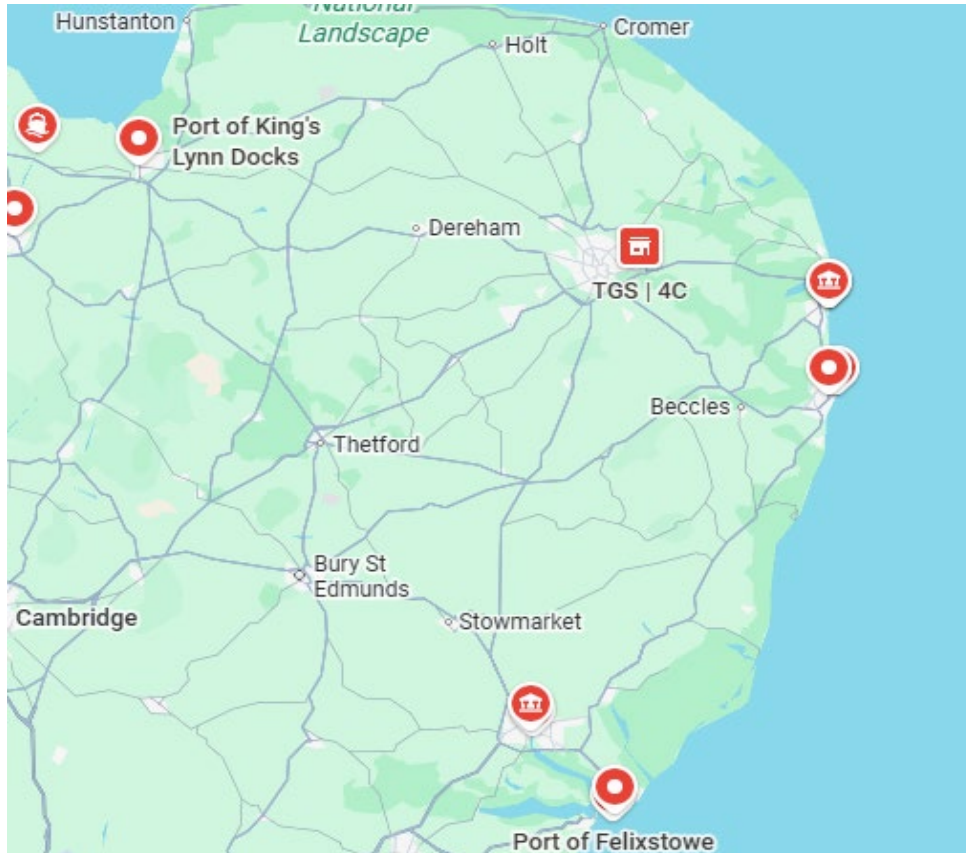
- Importance of education in finding opportunities.

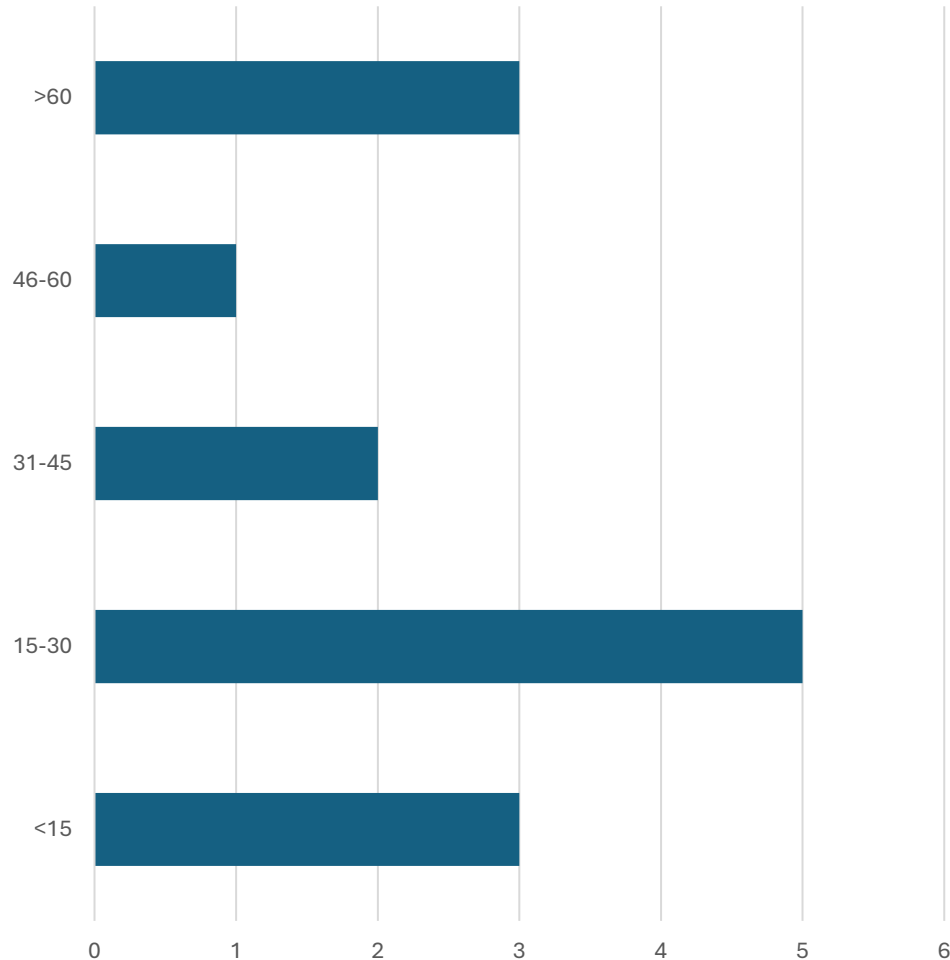

How many minutes it takes for students to get to work



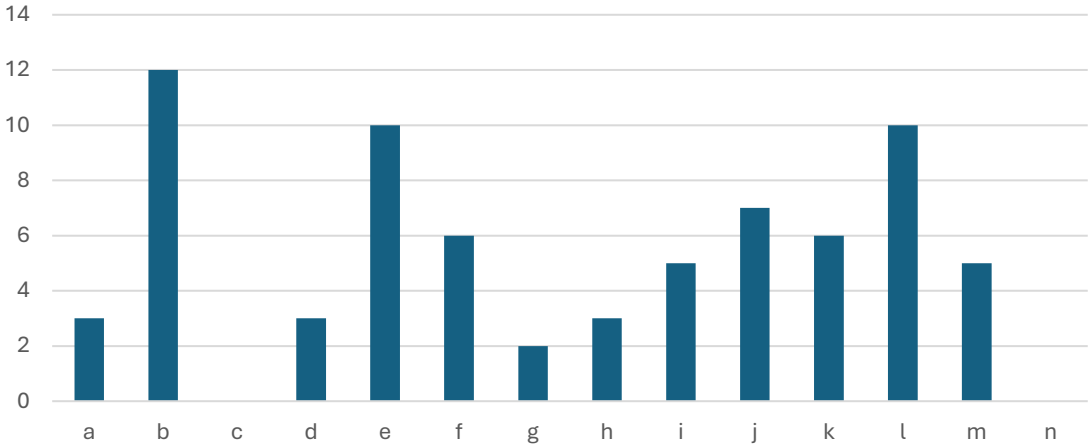

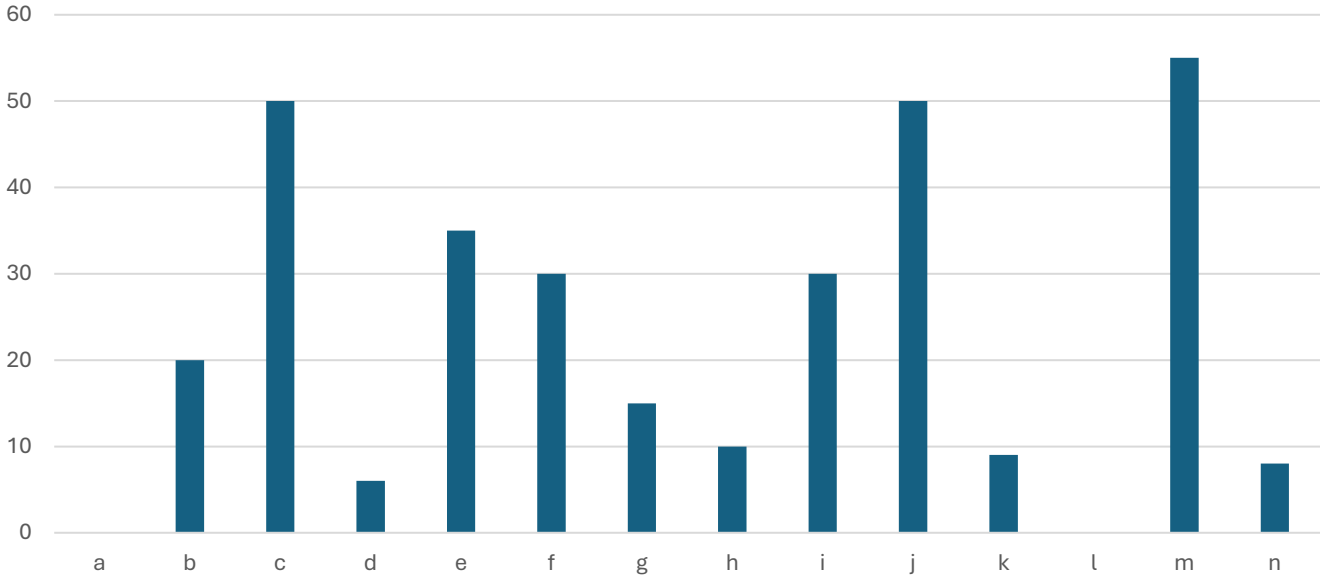

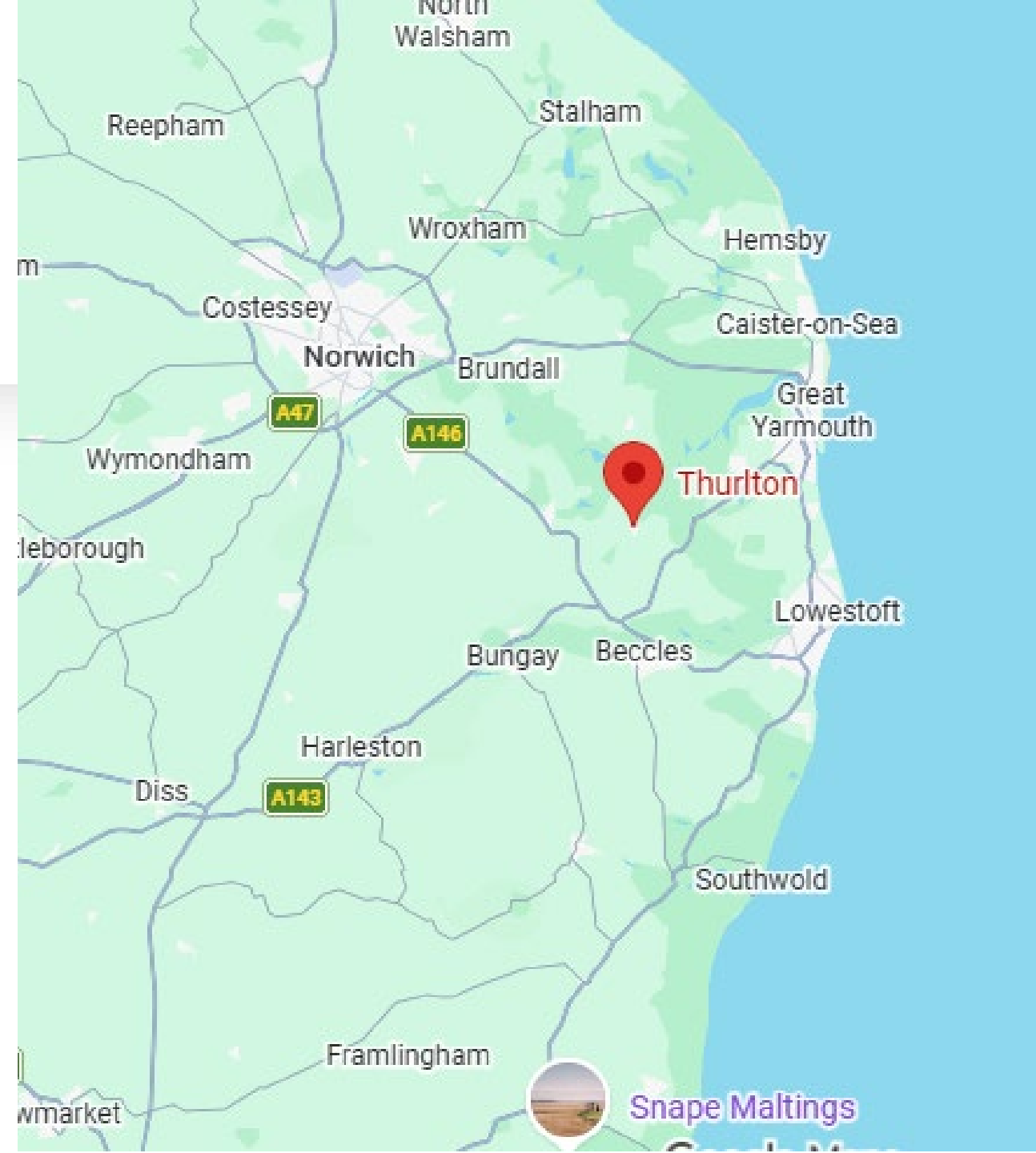
